### Assessment of Property Tax for the year 1960—61.

Sir,

There is a great agitation in the Citizens of D. P. Colonies regarding the illegal and unwarranted increase of the property tax. Several meetings have been held and several representations have been made by the public and various political and social bodies urging the necessity upon the Municipal Corporation to strictly act in accordance with the provisions of Law of the Country which lays down that the person, property and rights of the citizens are to be protected and are not to be interfered with till such an act has the support of the law of the land.

With this background in view several meetings of the House Owners' Association, West Patel Nagar, New Delhi, were held at different times. At one of its meetings it was decided that a deputation should wait upon the authorities together with the representation to be presented to them explaining to them the real import of the property tax which is not only illegal but has not the support of the law.

Consequently, we the undersigned deputationists on behalf of the House Owners' Association, West Patel Nagar, New Delhi, voice our strongest feelings of resentment against the illegal and arbitrary assessment of the property tax of the year 1950—61.

It is sad, that the provisions of the Municipal Corporation Act as contained in Sec: 116, 119, and 131 and the resolution of the Corporation passed at a special meeting held on 30th July 1959, is not being adhered to.

This illegal action is not only detrimental and harmful to the interests of the house owners but throws a degree of responsibility upon the assessment authority, as in most of the cases it has not acted in accordance with the law both in its official and private capacity. The House Owners' Association has tried its utmost to stem the wave of deep resentment amongst the house owners who have been rudely shocked at the illegal and arbitrary action of the assessors.

We cannot but bring to your kind notice that the subordinate staff and the assessing authority are not applying their minds to the individual cases and due to certain extraneous matters there is a great discrimination and disparity in the rateable value of similar houses with similar circumstances. It is therefore not understood what yardstick has been adopted in determining the rateable value of the different properties. An inquiry into this matter would not be uncalled for in the circumstances of the case.

Like other Associations who have submitted their representations, our Association also makes bold to put in the following suggestions which are quite reasonable, lawful and in keeping with the provisions of the law of the land, particularly the Delhi Rent Control Act 1958. According to the provisions of this Act a Municipal Corporation is not legally entitled to fix the annual rental value on the basis different from that which has been mentioned in Section 116 of the Act. It is necessary in each individual case, before assessment is made or amendment is contemplated, to issue a notice to the party concerned and ask him to put in an estimate of the constructional value of the property plus the market value of the land at the time of the construction and then to fix the annual rental value on this basis after having the case examined by an officer of the Municipal Corporation of no less a rank than the Assistant Engineer. The prospective assessee is also entitled to have an opportunity of producing such evidence as a domestic tribunal can receive in the circumstances of the case. This procedure is not being followed and as a result of which the poor assessee are being driven to have recourse to the law courts resulting in much of the worry and expenses.

Any mode of fixation other than this is not only illegal but would be deemed to be unreasonable also. The Corporation owes its existence to the Act of the parliament and after the promulgation of the Constitution it is the duty of every citizen and much more of the Municipal Corporation to respect the Parliamentary Acts and in case the Corporation deliberately or negligently violates the provisions of the Municipal Corporation Act and the Rent Control Act thereby nullifying the ultimate object of the Act, the matter can end in dire consequences.

The Act makes no distinction between the rental value of the accommodation of the self occupied premises and that of the accommodation let to the tenants. If some of the owners are charging exorbitant rents, the Municipal Corporation cannot be a party to the illegal gains of such house owners who are always exposed to the risk of being dragged into litigation by the tenants for reduction of rent or in some cases when the tenants vacate the house only after being exempted from the payment of substantial amount of rent of several past months. The owners also suffer when the tenants vacate the house and the house remains vacant till a suitable tenant is found. Even the applications for refund of the tax for vacant periods are turned down on one pretext or the other. It was for these reasons that the framers of the Municipal Corporation Act laid down a particular criterion for fixing the annual rental value. It is also suggested that in determining the cost of the construction and the market value of the land, the rates of the Central P. W. D. prevailing at the time of the construction of the Buildings in West Patel Nagar should be taken into consideration. It may also be stated that in the year 1950 to 1952 when most of the houses were constructed in West Patel Nagar, the value of the land was not more than Rs 11/- per Sq Yd. though the Government acquired the land at -/8/- a yard.

It would not be out of place to mention here that the Municipal Corporation has lost sight of the fact that most of the persons residing in West Patel Nagar are Displaced Persons who have not yet become the owners of the property and are mere allottees only (not allowed to sub-let or make alterations in the premises without permission according to the terms of allotment) as no Conveyance Deeds have been issued to them. Some of them have purchased the property on instalment basis spreading over a period of 7 years and under the Displaced Persons Compensation and Rehabilitation Act they are not to become the owners of the houses before the expiry of the period of 7 years. Till then the property is a part of the compensation pool and the property is exempted from the incidence of the tax as it is a Government property and therefore no liability for tax can be fixed on the occupants who have not yet become the rightful owners of the property. (vide section 119 of the Corporation Act)

In West Patel Nagar there are innumerable cases of widows/orphans/pensioners who have to depend on the little income derived by them from the houses on which they have spent all that they had in their possession and such persons are not in a position to bear the burden of the tax which has not been legally imposed and any inequitable act on the part of the Corporation to over-assess them is sufficient to break the back of the camel and to drive them towards disloyalty to the representative body in particular and the Govt. in general. Their cases deserve special attention on the part of the authority.

Anyhow there are a number of other suggestions which we are to make and it is unnecessary to detail them here as we have strong feelings against the degree of nepotism and favouritism that is prevailing in the subordinate staff of the Municipal Corporation. We cannot see eye to eye with the Executive attitude of the Administrative Wing of the Municipal Corporation though we fully realise and appreciate the efforts of the Municipal Councillors who have been moving in the matter from time to time in order to meet the just demands of the rate-payers of the Corporation.

We ardently hope that as true representatives of the masses and the rate-payers who have returned you to the Municipal Corporation, you would realise your responsibility towards the constituents, probe into the matter carefully and deeply, come to a definite findings and give proper relief and help to those who deserve it.

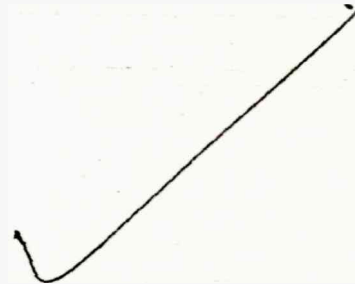

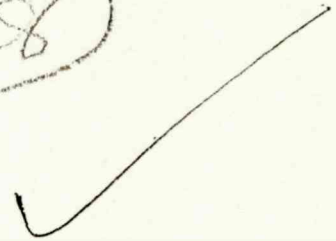

*Sub :* Proposal for acquisition of 5000 Bighas of most fertile agricultural land of village Naraina, which contains 40 irrigating wells in connection with the planned development of Delhi vide Notification No. F. 15 (III) / 59. LSG., dated 13.11.59 of Delhi Administration.

Sir,

I have been directed to invite your kind attention on the subject cited above and to lay down the following few facts for favour of your kind and sympathetic consideration at an early date :—

1. That the basic and fundamental thing in India is agriculture on which industry is going to be based. Therefore, our primary task is to tackle this food problem and increase food production even if we have to break our heads against the wall. The entire strength of the country should be put behind this drive.

In this connection, the Prime Minister said on Thursday that the importance of having heavy industries and greater agricultural production had been high lighted more in the face of the present crisis. He could not understand how any body could ignore the agricultural front. The Prime Minister further said that everything else had to be subordinated to this. Again in inaugurating the National Co-operative Development and Ware-Housing Board at the Central Hall of Parliament House, Mr. Nehru said that India was mainly an agricultural country with utmost pressure on land. If India was to have a bright future, people had to increase food production and gradually switch over to Industry to relieve the pressure on land. That was the way to make the country rich. Mr. Nehru has repeatedly warned that stress on a rapid industrialization of India at the cost of food production would be fatal. Continued dependence on foreign countries for the country's food requirements he added would endanger its economy and slow down the process of industrialization.

The President said in this connection that anything done to improve agriculture, stood far higher in importance and in its essential value than anything else done in the country. Agriculture was not only the biggest single item producing wealth in this country, it was also the biggest single item for finding employment for millions. Dr. Rajendra Prasad said that they had to raise the yield per acre and every agriculturist, whether he had three acres or five acres or a quarter of an acre, should produce more. If it was not done, their food problem would not be solved.

2. That the scheme of acquiring cultivable land for township etc. is against Government policy of 'Grow more food Campaign'. However its implementation is against the spirit conveyed by the Prime Minister of India in his speech delivered at Hyderabad (Deccan) i.e. "That hitherto they had been pampering cities at the expense of rural areas and it was time they devoted their attention more and more towards rural areas. The suggestion of utilizing fertile agricultural land for constructional purposes is therefore, hold good and such a scheme deserves to be shelved as per reasons stated above. On one side we find that the Government are providing land to cultivators for cultivation and here quite contrary to the Government policy, a scheme is proposed to be implemented whereby the cultivators are apt to be turned into beggars or coolies.

We are at a loss to understand why the National Interest is being pushed to the sake of one city or region or state. The file pushing administrators has staved off back by issuing these Notifications for freezing land and the production has been reduced. These acquisitions will do no good to the Greater Delhi Development but certainly will play havoc with the poor farmers who will lose their source of livelihood creating a socio-economic problem. Recently, our beloved Prime Minister said in Punjab, "It will be futile to expect those whose thoughts were rivetted only in respect of one city or one state to think in terms of the entire nation and impact of world currents on it."

The planned development of Delhi at the expense of a fertile land used for cultivation is against the Government policy of 'Grow More food campaign'. You will appreciate at this critical age, when our country is passing through a hard time, we cannot depend wholly upon foreign bread. It is a clarion call of the time that agricultural production should be increased at all costs. As oftenly repeated by our distinguished Prime Minister

"If our food front collapses, India collapses too".

3. That the land in questions is a fertile one and its acquisition would affect a whole village consisting of nearly 10000 persons and 2000 cattle. During the period of 47 years since 1912, our efforts were to make this portion of our land most productive by improving the means of irrigation, so much so that it now produces 90000 maunds of wheat and fresh vegetables. Recently Government granted Taccavi loans of rupees 20 lakhs (Twenty thousand) only to the villagers for atleast 10 wells. The best "Gajar" in the country of India is produced here and exported to the whole of India.

4. That the present proposal of acquisition of this most fertile land for the planned development of Delhi and preventing further speculation in Land transactions goes counter to the achievement derived in the first five year plan. This action of the Government is tantamount to nullifying the desired achievements of first and second five year plan.

5. That the total cultivable area in the country is about 30 crores acres and the scheme of acquiring cultivable land for township etc. will decrease the same considerably instead of adding another one crore. It is expected that in 1961, the human population of India will be about 42 crores and that of cattle 25 crores. That by 1961, 14 crore tons of food grains will have to be produced from 20 crore acres of land besides fodder crops and coarse grains for the cattle etc, leaving about 11 crores acres for cash crops, like cotton, jute, oil seeds sugar-cane, tea, coffee and rubber etc. Does the present decision of the Government to acquire cultivable land hold good at this juncture? Our suggestion in this respect is that for construction work, the land which lies barren or is not under cultivation may first be used.

6. That the standing committee of Delhi Municipal Corporation approved a communication from the Commissioner on the declaration of 4455 acres of land under the jurisdiction of the Corporation as Development areas under the Delhi Development Act. The approval was accompanied by the following recommendations :—

- (a) Only such land be declared a development area as can be acquired and developed within a period of five years.
- (b) Agricultural land should be the last to be acquired.
- (c) Persons displaced from the areas acquired for development should as far as possible be re-housed in the same areas.
- (d) Apprehensions that agricultural lands situated in areas marked for development purposes would fetch lower prices were again wrong, because a recent High Court judgement held that compensation for such agricultural lands should be according to the rates paid for the surrounding areas.

Under the circumstances, it is prayed that the proposal of acquisition of this most fertile land of our village may kindly be deferred as it comes into direct conflict with the achievements made in the first and second five year plans. The best that the Administration can do to prevent further speculation in land transactions is that the agriculturists may be asked to give an undertaking that they will not sell their agricultural lands to colonizers but to cultivate that.

Sir,

As you are probably aware, a team has recently been constituted by the Government of India to make a study of Panchayat Courts (Nyaya Panchayats) as regards their composition, jurisdiction and functions and recommend measures so as to improve the working of these courts as organs for the dispensation of speedy, cheap and impartial justice. The Study Team consists of:-

- (1) Shri G.R. Rajagopaul,  
Special Secretary to the Govt. of India,  
Ministry of Law;
- (2) Shri A. Prakash,  
Panchayats Commissioner,  
Ministry of Community Development and  
Co-operation; and
- (3) Shri K.R. Prabhu,  
Deputy Secretary,  
Ministry of Home Affairs.

2. The Study Team will, no doubt, have to make an on-the-spot study as early as possible. But before doing so, it would be grateful for the benefit of your views gained as a result of your experience on the working of Panchayat Courts in general, with particular reference to the following points:-

- (1) Whether any qualifications should be laid down for panchas, and, if so, what are those qualifications?
- (2) What would be the best method of selecting panchas? Whether it should be by election (open or secret, direct or indirect) or nomination or by any other method.
- (3) Whether any training should be imparted to panchas in the discharge of their judicial work and if so the nature and duration of such training.

(4).....

- (4) Whether any trained assistance given to panchas in the discharge of their judicial duties (whether by way of advice or by way of active participation in the functions of the Nyaya Panchayat or as Secretary to the Nyaya Panchayat or in any other manner) would be of any use in the administration of justice.
- (5) The nature and extent of jurisdiction that could be conferred on Nyaya Panchayats in civil and criminal cases and the safeguards that are necessary to prevent abuse - whether by way of administrative or judicial supervision or otherwise.
- (6) Whether Nyaya Panchayats could be clothed with conciliatory functions and, if so, the extent and nature thereof.
- (7) What type of procedure could be prescribed which, while being adequate, would also be conducive to speedy, cheap and impartial justice.
- (8) The steps that may be taken generally to make Panchayat Courts popular; and
- (9) Any other matter of special importance which in your opinion should be taken note of by the Study Team.

3. It would be of immense help to the Team if your views and replies to the Questionnaire are sent to the Secretary to the Study Team before the 15th January, 1961.

Subject: Labour Case work in the Industrial

Dear Comrade,

I was a Trade Union worker of the Defence  
Employees Organization from 1949 to 1952 when I was  
removed from the service due to Trade Union activities.  
Comm. G.H. Penderice, M.P. is a colleague of mine and  
knows me quite well.

After my discharge from service I did my M.B.  
and enrolled as an Advocate with a view to keep  
myself politically alive and attached with the labour  
movement. I had thought that the movement for which  
I had suffered and devoted the best years of my life,  
would be a source of support for me in my legal work.  
But unfortunately I have found in the Local Industrial  
Tribunal that the Comrades concerned do not think it  
worth their while to entrust Labour cases to trained  
Lawyers even though the Labour case work has become  
a specialized job and needs whole time attention and the  
handling of the work at the Industrial Tribunal stage  
is the most important step on which the success or

outcome of the case ultimately depends.

This question requires consideration of a high level of skill and judgment. The lawyers who, for political reasons, do not wish to take ~~to~~ employers' cases will feel handicapped and may even ultimately be ~~to~~ lost for the cause.

I therefore request you to kindly consider this matter seriously and communicate your decision to me.

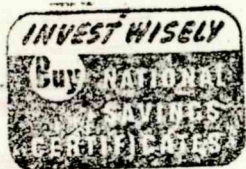
